Global Survey on Students Voice on the SDGs and the Issue of Poverty and in Management Education Launched in May, our global survey on students' views and perceptions regarding the SDG and the issue of poverty in management education is receiving responses from all over the world.

It was suggested that we keep the survey <u>open until</u> <u>30 September</u>, so that students enrolled in Fall classes also have an opportunity to express their opinions. The survey will remain open until then. Please encourage your next group of students to participate.

During the summer, the survey will be translated into 9 additional languages: Arabic, Bulgarian, Chinese, French, German, Portuguese, Russian, Serbo-Croatian, and Spanish. WG Symposium at EURAM 2018, Reykjavik Iceland, 20-23 June

Our WG Symposium on *Impact and Action-Oriented Research on Poverty & the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)* at <u>EURAM 2018</u> was successfully held on 21 June in a World Cafe format. Twenty-eight individuals attended the symposium session, representing 13 countries, and engaged in active conversations and idea building at four tables. The table themes and conversation advocates were: **Ginny Santiago** (the Philippines): The Role of Technology in Reaching the Poor; **Ted London** (USA): The Needed for an Integrated Student Experience to Develop Graduates to Work in the BoP Sector; **Consuelo Garcia de la Torre** (Mexico): Innovations in Student Engagement with Low Income Communities; and Martina Hutton (UK): Innovations in Research Approaches for Marginalized Groups. The session was co-chaired by WG members **Al Rosenbloom** and **Carole Parkes.**
