Dear Friends,

Hope you are fine and safe at the start of this new and quite specific academic season.

As the fall teaching season commences, we begin our **Working Group Update August 2020** with something different: A renewed commitment to the importance of poverty eradication through management education and the responsibilities we have, as a community of scholars, to continue tackling this issue through our work and this Working Group.

Poverty is increasing, due to the Covid-19 pandemic. The pandemic is having a disproportionate effect on middle and low-income individuals – including students.

- The World Bank estimates that global poverty rates will rise for the first time since 1990. This increase erases three decades of gains in poverty reduction.
- The World Bank also forecasts that between 71 million and 100 million individuals will fall back into the <u>ranks of the extreme poor</u>.
- Latin America will lose about 26.5 million jobs, according to the Inter-American Development Bank. Income inequality within countries is increasing.
- The <u>Indian economy shrank by 23.9%</u> from April to June. Migrant works were disproportionately affected. They not only saw their jobs vanish but also brought the virus to the rural areas when they returned home.
- <u>Enrollment will drop by 25% in universities</u> throughout Colombia, according to research done by the Laboratory of Economics of Education (LEE), Pontifica Universidad Javeriana, Bogota.
- A New York Times article (September 4, 2020) says, "At a public university in the city of Manizales, Colombia, one professor said it was costing her architecture students the price of one week of groceries to connect to the internet via cellphone for a single day of classes.
   Some students said they were going hungry to pay for data."

As we prepare for upcoming academic year, the mission of our Working Group has never been more relevant: To raise the issue of the poor and the marginalized in the courses we teach and in the scholarship we conduct AND to find creative ways to engage students given the extraordinary pressures they are experiencing during these most uncertain times.

## **Looking Forward**

We feel encouraged to see from this Update that our WG members, as well as our friends and partners, are active in relating their work to the above. We also feel a need for a new round of both internal and external consultations to explore how we, as the Working Group, could further realize our mission. We will be asking for your ideas and will present some of our own shortly.

## Anti-poverty Toolkit Gets Its Sustainability Mindset Sister!

Following the launch of the Anti-poverty Toolkit, our WG members from Radford University were invited to create a similar Toolkit for the PRME Sustainability Mindset Working Group. The <a href="Sustainability Mindset Toolkit">Sustainability Mindset Toolkit</a> was developed by our WG members **Tay Keong Tan** and **Anna Ogan.** Organized around the 12 Sustainability Mindset Principles, the free, open-resource platform is very helpful in supporting our work in the Decade of Action and the shift towards online learning. Both the Sustainability Mindset Toolkit and our <a href="Anti-poverty Toolkit">Anti-poverty Toolkit</a> are linked together because of the complementary and inter-dependent relation of these two issues.

## Working Group Supporting Members' and Youth related projects

Our WG continues co-sponsoring the International Student Essay Competition organized my our WG member **Anastasiya Marcheva** and D.A. Tsenov Academy, Svishtov, Bulgaria. The topic of this year's edition is <u>Youth Entrepreneurship – Current State, Problems, Opportunities</u> On behalf of our WG, we particularly welcome contributions related to the role that youth entrepreneurship could play in poverty alleviation and the advancement of the SDGs.

- At the International Academic Conference on Innovating Business Schools and Management 4.0, organized by ASCOLFA (Associations of Business Schools in Colombia), held virtually 24-28
   August, our WG member Gustavo Yepes hosted and moderated a plenary session on Sustainability and Responsible Education Networks. The panelists in the session were Florencia Librizzi (UNSDN), Gustavo Loiola (ISAE/FVG, Brazil), and our WG member Milenko Gudić (Serbia).
- Our WG member, Anastasiya Marcheva is sharing with us the free <u>Collection of Essays</u> from the last edition of the International Student Essay Competition.
- Our WG members **Raymond Saner** and **Lichia Yiu** (Switzerland) inform that they have added the ageing population to the thematic topics that they have been working on within the grid of SDGs. The elderly is a cross-cutting grouping of vulnerabilities, who have been disproportionally affected by the Covid-19 pandemic and include the poor, the uneducated, informal worker, the elderly and women. Of particular interest are two sub-themes: 1) the economic rights (i.e., to work) of young-old (age 60-80), and 2) the digital rights of the old persons for literacy and access. They were part of the technical committee that drafted a new ISO guideline standard on age inclusive workforce.
